Ballot Access Requirements for the June 17, 2025 Local Office Primary Elections and

The November 4, 2025 Local Office Special Elections

Definitions

<u>COMET</u> – Electronic campaign finance filing system offered by the Virginia Department of Elections.

Incumbent – An officeholder seeking reelection to the same office.

Independent – an individual who is seeking to run in a General Election without running as a Republican or Democrat (may include a recognized party or no party)

Non-primary party candidate – an individual who is seeking the nomination of a political party by a means other than a primary

Political party – An organization that, at either of the two preceding statewide general elections, received at least 10 percent of the total vote cast for any statewide office filled in that election

Primary candidate – an individual who is seeking the nomination of a political party by running in a primary

Qualified voter – A person who is entitled to vote under the Virginia Constitution and is properly registered to vote (*see Va. Code § 24.2-101*)

Recognized political party – An organization that meets the requirements set out in Va. Code § 24.2-612

Special Election – Any election that is held pursuant to law to fill a vacancy in office or to hold a referendum.

How candidates get on the ballot in VA

Follow these instructions to get on the ballot for:

- The Primary Election on Tuesday, June 17, 2025.
- The General Election on Tuesday, November 4, 2025.

These instructions are for candidates that are running for one of the vacated office special elections occurring during the November 4, 2025 General Election. The list of offices can be found on ELECT's website. The list is updated whenever a new special election is called.

If a vacancy occurs within 90 days of a November general election, the special election for the office will occur at the second November general election after the vacancy, unless a different date has been ordered for the special election. (Va. Code § 24.2-226)

Follow these steps to file your candidacy:

1. Fill out and submit a Certificate of Candidate Qualification (ELECT-501(4))

File starting **January 2, 2025.**File ending **April 3, 2025, at 5 pm.**

Non-primary party and independent candidates:

- 2nd November after vacancy: June 17, 2025 at 7 pm.

This form is deemed to be filed by the deadline if mailed to the <u>general registrar</u> on or before the deadline, postage prepaid by registered or certified mail. Receipt must show date mailed. The <u>general registrar</u> may request a scanned copy of the receipt.



Mail or deliver this form to the general registrar of your locality of residence.



The campaign contact information provided on this form will be included in the candidate list posted on ELECT's website.

2. Fill out and submit a Statement of Economic Interests (SOEI) - State and Local

Non-primary party and independent candidates:

File starting When the election is ordered, but not before January 2, 2025. File ending

- 1st November after vacancy: August 15, 2025 at 5 pm.
- 2nd November after vacancy: June 17, 2025 at 7 pm.

This form is deemed to be filed by the deadline if mailed to the <u>general registrar</u> on or before the deadline, postage prepaid by registered or certified mail. Receipt must show date mailed. The <u>general registrar</u> may request a scanned copy of the receipt.



Mail or deliver this form to the general registrar of your locality of residence.



Candidates not required to file:

- Incumbents (officeholders seeking reelection to the same office) who filed an SOEI pursuant to <u>Va. Code § 30.110</u> are not required to file with the <u>general registrar</u>.
- Candidates for member of the governing body or elected school board of any county, city, or town with a population of 3,500 persons or less.

Non-primary party and independent candidates are not required to file.

Filing fee:

File starting January 2, 2025. File ending April 3, 2025, at 5 pm.

Filing fee receipt:

File starting March 17, 2025 at noon (12 pm). File ending April 3, 2025, at 5 pm.

The primary filing fee receipt **must be filed with** your Declaration of Candidacy (4) and Petitions of Qualified Voters (5a).

The receipt must be **received** by the applicable deadline listed above. A postmark or other mailing service timestamp does not qualify.



Mail or deliver the primary filing fee to the Treasurer or Director of Finance of your locality of residence.

Mail or deliver the receipt to the political party chair of your locality of residence.



The primary filing fee equals 2% of one year's minimum salary attached to the office in effect in the year in which you file. Contact your local Treasurer or Director of Finance for the primary filing fee amount.

What happens to my primary filing fee if I am disqualified, unopposed, or withdraw?

- If you are disqualified or unopposed your filing fee will be refunded.
- If you withdraw
 - BEFORE the party chair files the Party Certification of Primary Candidates form with ELECT and the general registrar your filing fee will be refunded.
 - AFTER the party chair files the Party Certification of Primary Candidates form with ELECT and the general registrar your filing fee will NOT be refunded.
 - The window for party chairs to file is April 3, 2025, through April 8, 2025.

4 Fill out and submit a Declaration of Candidacy (SBE-505/520).

Non-primary party candidates are not required to file.

Independent candidates:

- 2nd November after vacancy: June 17, 2025 at 7 pm.

The Declaration of Candidacy **must be filed with** your primary filing fee receipt (3) if applicable, and Petitions of Qualified Voters (5a).

The form must be **received** by the applicable deadline listed above. A postmark or other mailing service timestamp does not qualify.



Primary candidates:

Mail or deliver this form to the political party chair of your locality of residence.

Independent candidates:

Mail or deliver this form to the general registrar of your locality of residence



Effective July 1, 2024 (<u>HB90/SB109</u>) the declaration of candidacy was revised to include a statement that if the signer's name appears on the primary ballot and they are not nominated then their name is not to be printed on the ballots for that office in the succeeding general election.

5 Collect petition signatures and submit <u>Petitions of Qualified Voters (SBE-506/521)</u>.

Non-primary party candidates are not required to file.

Effective July 1, 2024 (SB165) candidates may begin collecting petition signatures on January first of the year in which the election is held.

Petition pages are not required to be filed all at the same time; you may file pages throughout the filing window. However, the first petition page filed must be filed with your Declaration of Candidacy (4) and, if applicable, primary filing fee receipt (3b).

The pages must be **received** by the applicable deadline listed above. A postmark or other mailing service timestamp does not qualify.

Independent candidates:

May request notification of any problems that can be corrected before the filing deadline. Make this request by email to the <u>general registrar</u> of your locality of residence. The general registrar will provide the requested information when able but cannot guarantee a timely response as it will be dependent on the processing of the petition pages.

If notified by the general registrar that the required number of qualified voter signatures was not submitted, an appeal can be submitted to the local Electoral Board. The appeal must be submitted within 5 days of the disqualification notice being issued. You will need to prove that you have the correct number of signatures from qualified voters before the deadline. Find more information in 1 VAC 20-50-30.

Things to remember about petitions:

Petition Pages must...

- Be on the Virginia Department of Elections form. The form cannot be altered in any way.
- Be printed on one piece of paper, front and back. If the back is on a second piece of paper, the entire page (front and back) will be rendered invalid.
- Contain the signature, printed full name, and full registered residence address of each qualified voter and the date the voter signed. The last four (4) digits of the qualified voter's Social Security Number (SSN) would help in confirming the voter but is not required.

The petition circulator...

- Must be a legal resident of the United States.
- Cannot be a minor.
- Can be an individual who was convicted of a felony only if their voting rights are restored.
- Cannot be the circulator of the page on which they signed as a voter.
- Must sign the affidavit on each page they circulated in front of a notary.

When collecting your petition signatures, it is helpful to remember that...

- Because not all the people who sign petitions are qualified voters, ELECT recommends collecting at least 1 1/2 times the number of signatures required.
- Giving clear instructions on how a voter should fill out the page (provide all information in legible handwriting) will better the chances of a signature being accepted.
- <u>1VAC20-50-20</u> lists material omissions for petition signatures and pages. If your petition has a material omission, it may render the page or signature invalid.

The next two requirements relate to Campaign Finance accounts and reporting. While these are not ballot access requirements, non-compliance will result in penalties and the inability to qualify for, perform the duties of, or receive a salary or emoluments from the office.

6. Fill out and submit a Statement of Organization for a Candidate (SOO).

File within 10 days of performing one of the following:

- Accept a contribution.
- Spend any funds.
- Pay a filing fee.
- File a Certificate of Candidate Qualification.
- Appoint a campaign treasurer, campaign committee, or campaign depository.



Complete electronically in <u>COMET</u>, print two copies, sign both, then mail or deliver according to the instructions in <u>COMET</u> to:

- The Virginia Department of Elections.
- The <u>general registrar</u> of your locality of residence.



Campaign finance filing requirements are not a requirement of ballot access.

If you do not comply with all campaign finance requirements:

- You will have to pay penalties.
- You will not be permitted to qualify for any office, enter upon the duties thereof, or receive any salary or emoluments therefrom.

7. Submit Campaign Finance Reports

How do I withdraw my candidacy?

- Reference Virginia Code § 24.2-612.2
- A withdrawing candidate should submit their withdrawal notice with enough time before absentee voting commences to ensure their name is removed from the ballot.
- Mail, deliver, or email to your local <u>General Registrar</u>'s Office. The General Registrar will notify other affected General Registrars and/or the Virginia Department of Elections, as appropriate.
- To be withdrawn from the ballot you must submit a signed and notarized notice of withdrawal declaring your intent to withdraw from the election. Use the Virginia Department of Elections' Candidate Withdrawal Form (ELECT-612.2).

Effective January 1, 2025 (HB55/SB131)

- Withdrawal notices must now be notarized.
- If a candidate submits a notarized withdrawal notice to the general registrar between 44 days and 7 days before a primary election, and the result is only one remaining candidate that would then be unopposed, the remaining candidate will be declared the party's nominee for the office sought and the primary election will be cancelled.

Qualified Independent Candidate that Wishes to be Recognized as a Third-Party Candidate on the Ballot

Virginia Code § <u>24.2-613</u> allows for political party identification on the ballot for federal, statewide, and General Assembly offices only.

Local office candidates may seek party recognition for the purpose of ballot order, but the party identification will not be on the ballot.

The following two letters must be filed:

- 1. A letter signed by the State Chair stating the following:
 - o The group has been in existence for at least six months prior to the filing of its nominee.
 - The group has a state central committee composed of registered voters from each of Virginia's 11 congressional districts in continual existence for the six months prior to the filing of its nominee.
 - The group has a party plan and bylaws.
- 2. A letter signed by the State Chair and signed by the candidate stating the following:
 - The Chair certifies the candidate is the nominee of the party.
 - The candidate accepts the nomination of the party.
- Reference Virginia Code § 24.2-613.
- File starting When the election is ordered, but not before January 2, 2025. File ending
 - 1st November after vacancy: August 20, 2025.
 - 2nd November after vacancy: June 23, 2025.
- Mail, deliver, or email (ea@elections.virginia.gov) to the Virginia Department of Elections.
- The Virginia Department of Elections recommends that the independent candidate provide this information to the State Chair of their party. This presumably will assure that the party will provide the nominee with what they need to file with the Virginia Department of Elections by the appropriate deadline.
